Levels of Questions –Points: 5 points for every leveled question you write. Minimum: 2 Questions per Level.

<p>Level One: Knowledge/Literal <i>Level One: "Literal" - tend to be the real, factual types of questions: Example: What were Cinderella's shoes made of? Or can be simple Yes or No questions - not a lot of deeper thinking. <p>Level Two: Inferential, Compare/Contrast, Cause/Effect <i>Level Two: "Inferential" --you need to use background knowledge and make educated guesses. Example: Why don't Cinderella's sisters seem to like her? Level Three: “Off the Page” – beyond the text, synthesize, evaluating the text – think the what if’s, etc. Always refers to the text – not random connections.

Level Three: Synthesis Level - these are "off the page" - questions where the reader goes beyond the text and makes connections to larger ideas, and more questions...

Example: *Is the story of Cinderella outdated? Does it have any relevance (does it relate) to today?*

Example:

In the **story Cinderella**, a classic fairy tale, readers often don’t consider the larger themes of sibling rivalry. From the moment the two step-sisters begin to abuse Cinderella’s kindness and humility we see how deep **their hatred and jealousy goes**. When Cinderella wants to go to the ball too, “...they rip her clothes, and give her impossible tasks.” **This story still holds many truths today. Families often fight over limited resources, and brothers and sisters try to get their parents’ attention.** The moral of the story is to always be kind, and good things will result.
